Thank You Amanda Zaniesienko!

A brief announcement brought a mixed reaction from the members and friends of LEPOCO. "Amanda Zaniesienko has moved on to new opportunities..." As we wish Amanda all the best wherever life takes her, we know how much she will be missed.

Amanda came to LEPOCO in 2004 as a volunteer. She had signed up her young son, Max, for Peace Camp. From that modest beginning, she branched out into other areas of LEPOCO's work. She led a Peace Camp group that year and joined the Peace Camp Planning Committee. Her commitment to working for peace and justice continued as she joined the LEPOCO Peace Chorus and helped to set up the annual dinner. Many LEPOCO friends have been pleased to get to know her sons, Max and Adrian, as Peace Singers and as they helped with setting-up for annual dinners.

Amanda was hired in 2015; she left the staff briefly in 2016 and has been here ever since until the end of 2022. She says that it was a good fit for her. She knew a lot of people and she felt herself part of a community which she describes as unique and wonderful. Fully engaging in the work, she took on the website and other social media efforts. Her warmth, kindness, and gentle manner made her a perfect fit for LEPOCO.

Her work with Peace Camp continued throughout and she was an integral part of its success. In 2021 (during the pandemic), Amanda arranged for packets of art supplies – inexpensive items – that allowed campers to complete projects at home. In 2022, Peace Camp was a great challenge coming out of COVID with fewer attendees; nevertheless, LEPOCO rejoiced in its success. Margot Hillman, a Peace Camp coordinator, relates that Amanda brings her joy with her wonderful laugh, described as beautiful musical bubbles.

Amanda's particular contributions to LEPOCO arise from her friendly demeanor and her strong organizational skills. In the office, she answered the telephone with a smile that a caller could sense. Amanda has a quiet way of being a strength behind the scenes, always being prepared for setting up a community table or taking registrations for Peace Camp, communicating with volunteers, opening mail, and preparing mailings. She has found peace vigils, experienced as a planner and a participant, particularly meaningful.

Amanda's talent as an artist has been a boon to LEPOCO as she has created designs for posters, brochures, and t-shirts and contributed lovely paintings for the annual LEPOCO raffle (she has been the organizer of the raffle in recent years). If you have

visited the LEPOCO office in the last year you have seen her beautiful painting hanging on our down-thesteps entrance door — featuring the disarmament symbol of sunflowers like those on the LEPOCO t-shirt that she designed.

Amanda's hopes for the future of LEPOCO center on her concern that the organization is not attracting a lot of young people. Understanding the ways that young people of this current generation get involved with issues that they care about, things like the struggles in Yemen, the war in Ukraine, and conflicts in other places, is essential for LEPOCO's advocacy work. She has had opportunities for discussion with many students; she sees the need for LEPOCO to brand itself with a strong online presence.

Amanda has no disappointments with respect to her association with LEPOCO; she says, "It is a great organization." She notes that the people who are part of LEPOCO are among the most committed people she has ever met; they have staying power. At the same time, there is a need to find ways to reach out for younger members.

We are most grateful for Amanda's years of work with LEPOCO. Her regular welcoming presence in the office will be missed by all who visit the Peace Center. Everyone is happy to learn that she is committed to remaining involved in the work of LEPOCO.

The 2022 Christmas Peace Appeal

The Christmas Peace Appeal was one of the strong efforts by those seeking an end to the war in Ukraine. It was an international campaign that began in December and lasted through the various recognized Christmas seasons. Initiated by religious and secular organizations it was inspired by the 1914 spontaneous peace truce during World War I. (Besides historical accounts you can learn about the 1914 truce in the 2005 movie, "Joyeux Noel," and in the 1980s song by John McCutcheon, "Christmas in the Trenches.")

We don't know if there were any spontaneous battlefield truces in Ukraine *a la* WW I and official acknowledgement was meager. But the Appeal was an important consciousness-raising effort. A powerful sermon by Bishop William Barber, "We Need Ceasefires Everywhere," was aired on Democracy Now! on January 6 (see www.democracynow.org).


LEPOCO signed the appeal as an organization and urged individuals to sign.

Seeking Peace & Justice in The World House

On January 22, LEPOCO members and friends gathered for a program merging the honoring of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday season and the second anniversary of the going into force of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. The Stop the Wars Committee of LEPOCO planned a participatory program including a reading of excerpts from Chapter 6 of Dr. King's final book, "Where Do We Go From Here: Chaos or Community?" The chapter is titled, "The World House."

Over 25 of us gathered at the Lehigh Valley Friends Meeting where we sang together, read responsively, read many inspiring words from Dr. King and others, and signed postcards to Senator John Fetterman urging him to work in support of the U.S. joining the TPNW. We were reminded that 68 countries have ratified the TPNW, also known as the Nuclear Ban Treaty. We were also reminded that a letter was being delivered to President Biden on January 22nd, signed by over 100 local and national groups (including LEPOCO), calling on the President to sign the TPNW. March 11: Annual Gathering with Reggie Harris

An evening of great stories and music is in store as friends and members of LEPOCO welcome Reggie Harris to our Annual Gathering on March 11, 2023, at First Presbyterian Church of Bethlehem. The evening will begin with a social hour at 6:00 pm; dessert and beverages will be served. The program will begin at 7:00 pm.

Our featured guest, Reggie Harris is a singersongwriter, storyteller, world-renowned song-leader, and powerful interpreter of the global music narrative. As an expert on the music of the Underground Railroad and the Modern Civil Rights Movement Reggie Harris is known for focusing energy on the important role of music in the struggle for human rights using the lessons of history.

He was mentored by and is inspired by Pete Seeger, Bernice Johnson Reagon, and other elders of cultural music. He has performed and presented for thousands of all ages at colleges, schools, festivals, symposiums and concerts throughout the U.S., Canada, and Europe.

In 2021 he was the winner of the Spirit of Folk Award from Folk Alliance International and the W. E. B. Du Bois Legacy Award. In 2018 he was the recipient of a Magic Penny Award from the Children's Music Network for lifetime achievement in music.

Reggie is a charismatic community builder who was featured in 2020 on CNN's Silence is Not An Option with Don Lemon and in the New York Times discussing his familial connection as the descendant of slavery with his White cousins. He is a great-great-great grandson of confederate General Williams Carter Wickham and his slave Bibhanna Hewlett.

A teaching artist in the Kennedy Center's CETA program (Changing Education Through the Arts) and a fellow for the Council of Independent Colleges lecture program. He also serves as Co-President and Director of Music Education for the Living Legacy Project, an advocacy group that sponsors Civil Rights pilgrimages throughout the South and online education seminars worldwide.

Reggie is a featured artist in the "Americans Who Tell the Truth" Portrait Series by Maine artist Rob Shetterly.

We are delighted that Reggie Harris is finally able to be with us for a LEPOCO Gathering. He was scheduled to join us for the March 2020 Annual Dinner that had to be canceled due to covid.

Screening of
"Sorry We Missed You"

On Friday, February 17th, LEPOCO will screen the film, Sorry We Missed You (2019), at the Peace Center, on the campus of Rosemont Lutheran Church, 1705 West Broad St., Bethlehem (18018). Directed by the prize-winning, radical English director Ken Loach, this movie deals with the stressed lives of those forced to enter the new "gig economy" as "independent contractors." The film, part of LEPOCO's "Underground Reels & Spiels" series, will begin at 6:30 pm, and the screening (100 minutes) will be followed by a discussion.

The first film in the *Underground Reels & Spiels* series, "Picture a Scientist," was screened on January 13. It was an excellent presentation about three women scientists (a biologist, a chemist, and a geologist) in the Boston area and the harassment they experienced that led to their important and persistent efforts to make science more diverse, equitable and open to all. Kathryn Hoffman facilitated and Sheila Clever shared some of her experiences as a woman working in science.

She questioned how one can say negotiations are not possible when they have already been happening around prisoners and shipments of grain.

- ① Thank you to everyone who supported the **Holiday Open House** at LEPOCO. It was fun and we sold out of calendars early in December.
- Witness Against Torture returned to Washington, DC, this January for their first full Fast for Justice since the pandemic. They help us remember that Guantanamo has not closed. In the 21 years since the prison first opened 779 men have been held there. The vigilers called for the prison to be closed. They are also seeking accountability for U.S. crimes, care for the survivors, and reparations for the suffering that men and families have endured. - ♠ News reports tell us of "a silent battle" that involves the laying of flowers at the statue of a poet in Moscow. Russian authorities remove the flowers regularly. The ritual began January 14th following an attack on a residential building in the Ukrainian city of Dnipro: 46 killed and 80 injured. The statue is of Lesya Ukrainka, a Ukrainian poet and playwright who lived during the last decades of the Russian Empire.
